Although we have a steady waitlist of approximately 80 children and youth, she connects with each and everyone. The following schedule summarizes our fundraising accomplishments in 2019 compared to our previous year, 2018. Due to the decline in net profits from Ribfest and Bingo, our agency realized a net loss of \$19,191 from fundraising events.

AGENCY OPERATIONAL RESULTS:

The agency closed the year with a net deficit of \$7,258. Although this seems severe, the fact remains that our losses were \$16,818 less than the previous year. Assets to operate our agency equal \$18,000. The Company's debt amounts to \$38,427 for account payable and bank indebtness. Our agency again maintains a line of credit of 20,000 to assist in cash flow.

BIG BROTHERS BIG SISTERS MENTORING 1:1 | 17 MATCHES SERVED 2019

The BBBS mentoring program provides young people with a role model to talk to and share the experiences of growing up with. Through regular outings, a relationship is developed between the mentor and the mentee, which is built on trust and common interests, and is supported by our experienced case-workers. The result is a life-changing experience for both the mentor and the mentee.

The BBBS mentoring program usually requires two regularly scheduled outings a month of a few hours each and a minimum of a one year commitment.

IN-SCHOOL MENTORING | 72 MATCHES SERVED 2019

The In-School mentoring program provides youth with a role model and a friend to talk to and share the experiences of growing up within school grounds. For one hour a week, mentors meet with their mentee and engage in activities such as board games, crafts or just hang out on school grounds.

The In-School mentoring program requires a weekly visit of one hour for the duration of the school year. Matches do not meet over the summer break or during other school holidays.

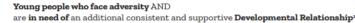

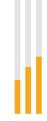
